

#### Pastor's Report

Dear friends,

The cover of this report features an image from Palm Sunday 2020. Beginning on the third Sunday of Lent, we chose to witness our love of God and love of neighbor by worshiping remotely. It was not something many of us ever imagined having to do. We also had received our shipment of palms for Palm Sunday, and we did not want them to go to waste. On a whim, I decided to place these palms along the Central Avenue sidewalk. I posted an invitation take a palm with you on the church sign. We received a thank you note from a neighbor. Someone else, going through a trial of their own, drove over at two in the morning to pick up a palm.

When I think of what I have learned from this past year, these palms became a central image for me. It is imperative that we imagine the life of the church outside of our walls. It is the only way that ministry in the twenty-first century will thrive. Placing these palms along Central Avenue also remind me that faith can be the most life-giving when we do not keep it within the walls of a church building. One question I have frequently asked in our ministry is: How do we blur the lines between the *secular* and the *sacred?* Another way to ask this question is: Are we seeking God by dwelling in both the *Word* and the *world?*"

As we begin to imagine life following the pandemic, I believe we have a unique opportunity as the Church. We are able to re-introduce ourselves to culture. The extent of the challenges ahead of us are unknown, but the Church must remain focused on the mission and vision given to us by God. And we must interpret God's mission and vision for us in ways that blur rigid lines between the secular and sacred. My belief is that God is already at work in the world, and that we have a duty to join ourselves to God's activity.

I am confident that First Presbyterian Church is capable of evaluating our ministry based on our fidelity to Jesus Christ. I believe that we are able to place our trust in following God, even when the topography of the world ahead of us has been re-shaped by the past year. And I hope that we remain open to the life-giving, creative power of the Holy Spirit. No matter the circumstances, these are necessary for a life-giving that blesses the world.

"Lo, How a Rose E'er Blooming" and "Hark! The Herald Angels Sing" were the result of this exciting collaboration. Your wonderful responses to these pieces were absolutely heartwarming!

I cannot begin to tell you how much Janet, Lara and I miss our choirs! It is not just the joy of making music together but it is missing the friendship, comradery and caring that the choir families give one another. Knowing that God is walking with us, we hope and pray that by fall of 2021 we will be experiencing something that looks a lot more normal! I give a very special thank you to all those who have volunteered as singers, ringers and instrumentalists during this time. Bravo!

#### From the Director of Faith Formation

Dear Siblings in Christ,

I recently learned of a common greeting, "Kasserian ingera", between Maasai warriors in Africa. It means, "And, how are the children?" With a long history, it remains a traditional greeting emphasizing the high value that the Maasai always place on children's well-being. Even those without children of their own would respond with the traditional answer, "All the children are well," meaning that peace and safety prevail, the most vulnerable are protected, and the community has not forgotten its reason for being. "All the children are well," means that life is good. Even in the midst of the daily struggles of existence and poverty and other hardships, we must remain steadfast in caring for every single child.

As the Body of Christ serving together in this shared ministry, it is my hope we will engage our living Baptismal vows by:

- nurturing a "safe faith space", physically and emotionally, where people feel invited to "wonder" and "wander" together with love and prayer;
- developing community and equipping individuals and families to share their faith, by word and deed, at home and in daily living; and,
- instilling the values of life-long learning and discipleship, thereby encouraging each child of God to know and follow Christ and be faithful members of his church.

#### Highlights from 2020:

- Explored new forms of ministry through The Purple Table, our Design Team's idea for our \$15,000 grant from Princeton Theological Seminary. The Purple Table is a pop-up welcome space in the form of a purple table, online and in-person, to build community, to affirm, and to support healing. Worked to build community through the summer's intergenerational Compassion Camp, Zoom gatherings of many flavors, and the equipping of welcome spaces and activities people can engage at home. Shared gifts of affirmation with the church staff, the Design Team, and the PreK Readiness Program. Supported healing through individual connections as well as nurturing new ideas to honor our faith traditions given limitations imposed by the pandemic. One such idea resulted in a prayer-filled Christmas Tree on the front steps of the church along with a supply of Advent gifts for the community.
- Shared Godly Play stories in a variety of new ways including Circle Time messages and online content through The Purple Table. Acquired new story materials and developed rotating boxes for "Stories of Faith at Home" to begin in January 2021.
- Preached during Sunday worship on a quarterly basis as an additional form of support during the pandemic.

I am deeply grateful for opportunities to engage with other ministry leaders, worship, study, reflect, and grow in my personal relationship with God. I also love dreaming about what adventures may lie ahead for faith formation in our church and community! Growing opportunities in 2020:

- Participated, virtually, in the Arts, Recreation, and Worship Conference in May.
- Accepted the unique invitation to serve the greater church again as Co-Director for the 2022 Montreat Youth Conference.
- Served as the Design Fellow for our work with Princeton Theological Seminary's Log College Project, exploring innovation and creating new forms of ministry with Youth.
- Met regularly with ministry leaders from the Presbytery of Miami Valley to share ideas, ask questions, and seek ways to support one another in our individual ministries.

 Participated in multiple book groups committed to learning about and advocating for social and racial justice.

In closing, I give thanks for this shared journey in ministry and friendship. I truly delight in "wondering and wandering" with you, learning from you, dreaming with you, and serving with you!

#### From the Director of the Pre-Kindergarten Readiness Program

The Pre-Kindergarten Readiness Program has been at the First Presbyterian Church since the mid 60's. Dee Emmons began the program while her husband, Dr. Irvin Emmons, was the pastor here.

The purpose of our program is to provide kindergarten readiness for children whose families do not qualify for federal or state-funded programs, but who cannot afford a private preschool program. There has never been a charge for any child to attend school here.

We are regulated by the Ohio Department of Job and Family Services. The State inspects our program once a year and we strictly follow all their guidelines. We currently have 14 children. Kindergarten readiness is held on Tuesday, Wednesday, and Thursday mornings, September through May.

The goal of our program is to help prepare each child for kindergarten. We include readiness activities in the fields of reading, language, art, music, number concepts, finger plays, science, and social studies. We also celebrate many themes and holidays throughout the year. We work with the children on many different skills - social, small and large motor, listening, following directions, sharing, and taking turns.

The staff has been trained in First Aid, CPR, Communicable Diseases, and Child Abuse & Neglect. This training is required every three years, except CPR, which is every two years. We also have in place an emergency plan if the children need to leave the building, and also have a fire drill plan and a tornado drill plan.

The director and teachers in the program have many years of teaching and education in their backgrounds. I am honored to be the Director/lead teacher since July 2010, and look forward to future years. I have BS and MS Degrees in Elementary Education. I also have a Kindergarten Certification. This school year we welcomed Lindsey Jenkins to our Pre-k team as a second teacher. Lindsey and I look forward to fun in learning every day with our students. It has been a joy, a blessing and very rewarding being with and working with these four and five year-old children.

The financial support of the First Presbyterian Church and the wonderful assistance we receive from the office staff, custodial staff, and whomever else we ask for help is outstanding! We are forever thankful for the church in sponsoring this wonderful mission.

#### From the Mission Team

The Mission Committee faithfully continued our important work throughout the past year. We tried to be responsive to any unexpected need that came up. We communicated with the congregation the need for volunteers to make masks for visitors at Atrium Health. The church parking lot was set up as a drop-off site for donations for Premier Health Network. Our congregation collected over 300 blankets for people who are homeless this winter.

We continue to fund our own **Pre-Kindergarten Readiness Program**, which began its program with a delayed start in October this year. **Highview sixth grade school** continues to receive school supplies and funding for their STEAM program due to your generous monetary donations at the beginning of each school year. The **FISH** Fund continues funding birth certificates and helps with utilities. This Christmas season the Mission Committee was responsible for the organization of the **Christmas Basket Program**. It was definitely a team effort combining the experience of key people, the donations and delivery of gifts by the congregation, and the office staff's help keeping us organized.

We received a generous bequest from the estate of Fearn Geber. She wanted the church to support clean water, medical training, and affordable housing. We gave equal portions to Tandana for a well in Mali, created a scholarship for a medical worker throughout the Community Foundation, and are supporting the rebuilding of homes following the Dayton tornadoes through the Presbytery of Miami Valley.

Last February, the Mission Committee was excited to attend the open-house of the new **Hope House** on Grove Street. First Presbyterian was recognized for both the monetary and community support we have been able to share over the 30 years of the organization's existence. The support for furnishing both a common area and an apartment in this new facility is our most recent contribution. There are plaques throughout the building recognizing First Presbyterian as a partner with Hope House.

We are grateful for your monetary and time and talent donations this past year.

We conducted a neighborhood survey with our consultant, Jonathan Sparks-Franklin. We distributed this survey door-to-door within about a half-mile radius around the church. This is an important inventory of the passions, interests, and gifts of our community. We look forward to trying to connect with these interests and become a resource for our neighbors. For example, we were surprised by the number of responses identifying environmental, ecological, and gardening interests and concerns. We could group these generally under the category of "green." This led to Pastor Isaacs initiating a virtual Theological Forum on Creation Care in July. This made be worth considering offering again in-person and inviting our neighbors.

#### From the Board of Deacons

What are they? What do they do? Those questions have colored the work of the deacons this past year. The PCUSA Book of Order offers this description for the office of deacon: "The ministry of deacon as set forth in Scripture is one of compassion, witness, and service, sharing in the redeeming love of Jesus Christ for the poor, the hungry, the sick, the lost, the friendless, the oppressed, those burdened by unjust policies or structures, or anyone in distress. Persons of spiritual character, honest repute, exemplary lives, brotherly and sisterly love, sincere compassion, and sound judgment should be chosen for this ministry."

Put more simply: Deacons are called to a ministry of compassion and care-giving.

This vision and role of the deacons continues to be refined, and nourished in our congregation. One initiative that has flourished in the past year is the Deacon's commitment to "extending the communion table." This means that after the congregation takes communion that pairs of deacons are willing to take communion to those who are unable to attend worship. If you or someone you know would like to be included in this, please let Nancy Peterson or Sandy Fisher know.

One characteristic of the past year was the increased number of funerals in the congregation. Deacons provided receptions for many of these funeral services. Additionally, the deacons send out material to support people in the months following a loss. Notes were sent to families of people included on the necrology on All Saints Day informing them that we continue to pray for them after their loss. The deacons hosted a Longest Night Service the week before Christmas for those whom the holidays may be difficult.

The Deacons would like to be able to provide a time and space to support people who might be dealing with grief. If this would be important to you or have an idea for facilitating this, please let us know.

Deacons spend a third of each meeting doing training and being equipped for the work of ministry. Some of their training modules from this year include:

- The call of the deacon
- Cultivating a ministry of presence
- Praying with others
- Being an active listener
- Sharing communion with those unable to attend worship
- Note writing
- Mourning, Grief, and Complicated Grief

One challenge facing the deacons is a lack of male representation. If you are a male with gifts of compassion and care-giving, we ask that you prayerfully consider if you may be called to join us in this important work.

#### From the Administration and Personnel Committee:

There were no personnel changes in 2020.

Maggie Pasternak voluntarily reduced her hours, reflecting the amount of time it takes to complete her job. These hours remain flexible depending on the time of year.

Our staff spent much of the year working from home as our building remained restricted due to COVID-19.

Online worship began March 18, 2020.

Year-end bonuses were given in January 2021, as a surplus in the 2020 budget permitted.

We were saddened at the loss of long-time committee member David Francis, who passed away.

Our thanks go out to all of the staff as the pandemic has caused everyone to be creative and continue to do.

I would like to thank committee members Donna Chaney, Tricia Neeley, Paul Nisbet, Beckie Rudd, and Ken Thomas for their participation.

#### From the Finance Committee:

Our responsibilities include presenting the annual budget to Session, monitoring monthly income and expenses for the Operating Budget and Building & Grounds Budget, providing oversight of the Support Funds, meeting quarterly with the Investment Manager of the Endowment Fund, dispersing scholarship funds and providing oversight to the Treasurer and Church Administrator.

Pledge contributions are the main source of income for the operating budget. Expenses mainly include personnel, office, Christian Nurture programming, worship & music, facility supplies and mission giving. Mission giving in the budget is designated for denominational support and local outreach. The 2020 Operating Budget was approved with a deficit, but through faithful support and careful expense management, the church had a surplus of over \$22,000. These funds were used for employee bonuses with the remaining placed in the Contingency Fund.

The Building & Grounds Budget is funded by the Endowment Fund and covers building expenses which include maintenance, insurance and utilities (gas, electric and water). During the year, over \$86,000 was spent.

The Contingency Fund receives income from the Fondersmith, Juengling and Chennault trusts as well as any operating budget surplus. Those funds are used for larger non-budget expenses. Large projects funded during 2020included: steeple painting (\$30,139), concrete work off McGee (\$20,600), new phone system (\$4,286), radiator repairs (\$3,157) and Ion Air purifier (\$2,424).

We continue to be grateful and blessed for the gifts of resources, time and talents that support our ministry.

#### **SUPPORT FUNDS SUMMARY**

Established by the Trustees, Support Funds are used for projects and ministry beyond the scope of the operating budget. Income into the funds comes from one or more of the following sources: memorials; bequests; special gifts; fund raising efforts and money market interest.
