Children's Ministries

With Gratitude, Dinner Church in October



Thank you to all who participated in the October series of Dinner Church! We enjoyed exploring the Psalms while worshiping and breaking bread together. We are especially grateful to dinner hosts and all who participated in song and prayer and storytelling!

Log College Project - prepare to launch!

During worship on October 27, the Design Team shared our idea for a new form of ministering with youth in the form of a purple pop-up table. We want to share a sense of acceptance—rooted in God's grace and love—with the world.

The reality is many of our youth have had to withstand bullying, questions of identity, and other forms of crises. The team decided to take our ministry of accepting presence out into the community by way of a pop-up welcome min-

istry that shares a simple "feast" in places where people feel unwelcomed or hurt. We'll host three different types of pop-ups around a portable purple table--for healing, for affirmation, and for community-building.

What might this look like? When there are places in our community that experience some type of trauma, there is interest in going to that space with our Purple Table to witness God's welcome, and to help change the story. We would also like to take the Purple Table to community events such as First Fridays, Sparkles 5K, etc. We also will take the Purple Table to city parks for random pop-up picnics to build community.

Hello! My name is Jonathan Sparks-Franklin. I am the new Community Listener here at FPC. Pastor Michael, along with the Session and the Vision and Strategy Committee, have taken a strong interest in reimagining the church's relationship to the surrounding neighborhood.

The primary goal is to shift our missional thinking from a posture of scarcity to a posture of abundance. Whereas churches have historically taken a *needs-based* approach to the community, focusing on its *problems* and how the church can fix these, the leaders at FPC have alternatively decided to focus on the community's strengths, talents, and giftings. What are some of the specific assets unique to this particular neighborhood? How is God already creatively working here in Middletown? And most importantly, how can we as a church support and partner with the good that is already happening all around us?

This is where I come in. As a community listener, my role is to not only establish relationships with local people and organizations, but to listen to their particular visions, values, and dreams. Over the next six months I will be meeting with as many folks as possible as I attempt to discern the exciting ways in which God is already working here in Middletown. Father's I recently asked a check-out clerk at a local supermarket how often customers asked to use paper bags rather than the thin plastic bags routinely used to package groceries. She said "not very many."

All of us want a healthy climate but wishing for it won't get us there. Trash disposal increases every year. We are filling up our landfills with plastic grocery bags and other items that can be recycled if we take the time and have the knowledge to ensure our waste goes to the proper place.

My goal in this "green column" is to pass along information to promote recycling. That's the easy part, but disposing of our trash isn't always as easy or convenient.

You and I are the first level of recycling. Our trash hauler Rumpke is the second, and there are numerous other recycling centers that can dispose of much of what Rumpke cannot.

With each green column we hope we can offer what you and your neighbors need if you feel a greener world is important, and who doesn't.

Just using common sense can help reduce the waste stream. Here are a few suggestions:

Food waste can be placed in a compost bin and used in your vegetable and flower gardens. You can purchase items at the store that are not packaged in plastic. Use a reusable bag to carry them home.

A good first step by anyone interested in a greener world is to obtain a recycle bin from the city by picking one up at your city building. In the City of Middletown, you can call 513-425-7960 for either a red small bin or a larger green one on rollers. They are free.

Diagrams on the bins show what to recycle and what not to recycle. Or, you can use recycle drop-off boxes around town. You can get a list by calling 513-887-3653. We will give you specific locations in a future column. You can also go to "recycle.bcohio.us" and look under "community drop off box."

Tip of the Day: Stuff all your thin plastic grocery bags into a bag and return them to your Kroger or other major grocery store. They recycle the bags.

In the meantime, always remember, by not crowding the earth with our waste products, a greener world can help save wildlife and maybe even us. Have a good green day!
